Child and Adolescent Well-Care Visits (WCV)

This HEDIS measure looks at **members ages 3 to 21 years of age** who had at least one comprehensive well-care visit with a PCP or OB/GYN during the measurement year.



Record your efforts

Record your efforts

Documentation must include a note indicating a visit to a PCP or OB/GYN, the date when the Texas Health Steps/Well-Child visit occurred and evidence of *all* of the following:

- **Health history:** Health history is an assessment of the member's history of disease or illness. Health history can include, but is not limited to, past illness (or lack of illness), surgery or hospitalization (or lack of surgery or hospitalization), family health history, immunizations, medications and allergies.
- **Physical developmental:** Physical developmental assesses specific age-appropriate physical developmental milestones, which are physical skills seen in children as they grow and develop.
- **Mental developmental:** Mental developmental assesses specific age-appropriate mental developmental milestones, which are behaviors seen in children as they grow and develop.
- **Physical exam:** (for example, height, weight, BMI, heart, lungs, abdomen, more than one system assessed)
- **Health education/anticipatory guidance:** Health education/anticipatory guidance is given by the health care provider to parents or guardians in anticipation of emerging issues that a child and family may face.
 - *Handouts given during the visit without evidence of a discussion is considered non-compliant.*

(If you encounter abnormalities or address a pre-existing problem during a well-child visit and the problem/abnormality is significant enough to require additional work to perform the key components of problem-oriented services, please use applicable codes.)

Helpful tips

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- Use your member roster to contact members who are due for an annual exam.
- Schedule the next visit at the end of the appointment.
- If you use EMRs, consider creating a flag to track members due or past due for preventive services. If you do not use EMRs, consider creating a manual tracking method for well checks. Sick visits may be missed opportunities for your patient to get health checks.
- Consider extending your office hours into the evening, early morning or weekend to accommodate working parents.
- Include the applicable, accurate codes noted above on the claim form to ensure more accurate documentation of preventive care services rendered.
- Services may be rendered during a visit other than a well-child visit if the specified documentation is present and is not part of an acute or chronic condition assessment or treatment.
